Capacity

- An important medico legal concept (MCA 2005)
- In essence- whether an individual has the ability to make their own decision (does not have to be a wise decision)
- Capacity is situational specific
- It may fluctuate.
- Capacity will inevitably be lost as dementia progresses.

Future Wishes

- Make decisions and plans early whilst an individual has the capacity to express their wishes
 - Have an up to date will
 - Consider setting up a Lasting Power of Attorney
 - Consider an Advanced Decision about the type of care you may or may not want in the future
 - Discuss with family and carers about the future and type of care you may want.

Financial Issues

- Talk to the bank about 3rd Party Mandates to allow someone else to deal with bank accounts. (Joint accounts may be problematic)
- Consider 'chip and signature' cards so a PIN does not need to be remembered
- Benefits-
 - dementia sufferer. If >65 Attendance Allowance (<65 Personal Independence Payment). If still working then other in work benefits may apply
 - Carers may be eligible for Carers Allowance

Financial and Legal Issues

- Benefits
 - Council tax exemption may apply
 - Social services, Age UK and Citizen Advice Bureau can all provide help and guidance.
- Contact the DVLA
- Inform you car insurer.

Lasting Power of Attorney

(Enduring Power of Attorney)

- Allows you (donor) to appoint someone you trust (your attorney) to make decisions on your behalf if you are no longer able to do so
- 2 types-
 - Property and Financial Affairs
 - Personal Welfare
- The LPA must be signed by a certificate provider. They must be someone you know well or a professional person, such as a doctor, social worker or solicitor.
- Needs to be registered with the Office of Public Guardian
- Property and Finance can be enacted at anytime but Personal Welfare relies of the loss of capacity of the donor before the attorney can make decisions on their behalf

Court of Protection

- If a person lacks capacity and has not created a LPA then an application to the CoP will have to take place
- They will nominate a Deputy (who acts like an attorney) to take care of the patients affairs
- Individuals can apply to the Court to be appointed a Deputy.
- It is expensive and time-consuming.

Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards

- DOLS- introduced in 2009 in response to criticism from European Court of Human Rights
- Usually applies to patients without capacity in care homes or hospital.
- If a person is identified as being deprived of their liberty then the *local supervisory body* (North Somerset Council if in care home) have to be informed and an assessment made.
- A DOLS is valid for a year only
- The Coroner has to be informed if a patient dies with a DOLS in place.

Developments in Dementia

- Political commitment
 - G8 dementia summit in December 2013
 - World Dementia Council
 - UK dementia Strategy-
 - Awareness- Dementia Friends
- Research
 - Diagnosis- medical training, biological markers, scanning
 - Prevention-vaccination? (control hypertension, diabetes, obesity
 - Treatment- immunotherapy, medications
- Prevention- works best at a population level-
 - Healthy heart = healthy mind
